The service

Introduction

The Care Inspectorate regulates care services in Scotland. Information in relation to all care services is available on our website at www.careinspectorate.com.

The service is registered to provide care from Ms Deane's home in North Lanarkshire. Ms Deane is registered to provide care for a maximum of six children under the age of 16 at any one time, of whom no more than three are not yet attending primary school and of whom no more than one is under 12 months. The numbers are inclusive of the childminder's own family.

From 1 June 2017 until 31 August 2018, on two or three days across Monday to Wednesday, during term-time only, to provide a care service to a maximum of seven children at any one time under the age of 16, of whom no more than four are not yet attending primary school and of whom no more than one is under 12 months. Numbers are inclusive of the childminder's family. This element of the conditions only applies to the children identified in the variation application dated 25 January 2017. Should any of the children leave the service or no longer require care before 31 August 2018, this element of the condition will cease with immediate effect.

Mr Gary Meudell is employed as an assistant.

Ms Deane aims to provide a "happy, friendly and caring environment" for both parents and children. .

Six children were registered to receive care during the week of the inspection, one child was present on the day of the inspection.

What we did during our inspection

We compiled this report following a short notice inspection which took place between 09:25 and 11:45 on the 31 May 2018. This inspection was carried out by an Inspector.

During the inspection we spoke to the childminder and the minded children present. We looked at a number of documents including health and safety records, personal plans and certificates of training.

We check services are meeting the principles of Getting it Right for Every Child, Scotland's national approach to improving outcomes and wellbeing for children by offering the right help at the right time from the right people. It supports them and their parent(s) to work with services that can help them. There are eight wellbeing indicators at the heart of Getting it Right for Every Child: safe, healthy, achieving, nurtured, active, respected, responsible and included.

Views of people using the service

We gathered the view from one parent of a child using the service, they told us they were very happy with the service provided. The childminder had worked with them to meet their child's needs and their child had participated in a range of activities at home and out and about in the local community. The parent described the service as 'a home, from home' and told us the childminder had been very supportive and shared lots of advice, for example in relation to childhood illnesses and child development needs.

We observed the minded child present and found them to be very settled and comfortable in the childminder's home and garden. The child was having fun playing with a range of toys.

Self assessment

The Care Inspectorate received a completed self-assessment from the childminder. The childminder identified what they thought they did well.

What the service did well

The childminder's home was welcoming and friendly. The childminder had made good use of the space available to them and had a wide range of resources inside and outside their home. The childminder was well informed about childhood illnesses, child development and about the safe guarding of children. The childminder was confident discussing examples of how they had supported children's needs in partnership with families and other professionals.

The childminder was registered as a food business and provided healthy, homemade, nutritious foods for the children and encouraged children to participate in regular active play.

What the service could do better

Sections of the childminder's garden were under development. The childminder informed us that these areas were not in use and would not be used until safe and secure. The childminder had a trampoline we advised the childminder to check the manufacturers recommended age restrictions.

To further support the evaluation and continuous improvement of the service, the childminder should gain copies and read good practice guidance documents such as Build the Ambition, Child Smile and the Health and Social Care Standards.

Quality of care and support

Findings from the inspection

We asked the childminder how they identified and supported children's needs. The childminder explained that before a child starts using the service they met with the child and family members to discuss the care to be provided. This included information about children's daily routine, personal preferences and development needs. New children were encouraged to have settling in visits to become familiar with new surrounding and create a bond with the childminder.

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Once children were settled and the childminder got to know them, the childminder put in place a personal planning folder for each child to record their needs and how they planned to supported these. Through observing children's progress and regularly discussing changes with parents, the childminder kept well informed about each child's needs. This allowed the childminder to provide the right care and support. We advised the childminder to review the different methods used to record such information, this is to reduce duplication and ensure all paperwork held is meaningful and supports them to provide the right care for each child. To further support the childminder identify children's needs and how to support these, the childminder should refer to quidance documents such as Health and Social Care Standards and Building the Ambition.

The childminder provided the daily meals and snacks. They consulted with the children and families to find out the types of foods they liked and any dietary needs. The childminder told us that they provide homemade foods.

We were satisfied with the childminder's polices and procedures to ensure the safeguarding of children. The childminder had completed child protection training since the last inspection, they did agree that they would organise to up date this again before their next inspection.

The childminder had reviewed and updated the management of medication policies following the last inspection. We found the policy to be meeting good practice guidance. On checking the records held we advised the childminder to record more detail on the consent form such as the dosage of medication to be given.

On the day of inspection we found the child present to be happy, content and having formed a positive relationship with the childminder. they were fully engaged in their play exploring and being creative.

Quality of environment

Findings from the inspection

The childminder used the open plan living room and dining area, downstairs toilet, kitchen and garden for childminding. The childminder's home was found to be clean, tidy and having safety measures in place such as a safety gate to separate the main play space from the childminder's dogs space. There was also a designated outdoor space for the dog. The childminder had a policy in place for the dog which followed good practice guidelines.

The living room was spacious and, on the day of the visit, there was a selection of toys for the child to choose from. The decked garden area provided an area for children to play outside. The childminder explained they were developing an area of the garden, until this is completed this area will not be used by the children.

The childminder had a trampoline in the garden, we advised the childminder to ensure they followed the manufactures guidelines. For example age restrictions.

The childminder told us that they followed nappy changing good practice guidelines and had a designated space for nappy changing.

The service was registered as a food business and followed safe food practices.

The childminder ensured that children were out and about in the local community making good use of resources. This included local parks, sand pits and groups.

We found the childminder was making good use of the space and resources available to them to meet children's needs, wishes and choices.

Quality of staffing

Findings from the inspection

The childminder's assistant had undergone the appropriate safety checks with the Protection Vulnerable Group Scheme (PVG). This was undertaken when the assistant was added to the conditions of registration following a variation submitted in 2009.

The service had a whistle blowing policy in place and stated the assistant had completed first aid training.

We discussed the role of the assistant with the childminder. The childminder told us that the assistant had never worked in the service. The childminder agreed that if the assistant was to work in the service they would ensure that they completed an induction, that they were informed about their roles and responsibilities, polices and procedures and any training required would be completed.

Quality of management and leadership

Findings from the inspection

We asked the childminder about how they kept up to date with good practice guidance and legislation. The childminder told us they had read materials including magazines by the Care Inspectorate and SCMA and that they had attended training in first aid, food hygiene and child protection since the last inspection. We discussed with the childminder the benefits of planning, identifying and recording the impact of all learning and development opportunities. For example having evidence to support new learning and skills as a result of completed training.

The childminder used daily discussions, questionnaires and, when requested, daily diaries to gather and share information from those using the service.

We did discuss with the childminder to consider undertaking some development and training to support their professional development. For example in writing and planning to meet children's needs and keeping up to date with good practice guidance documents. In addition when discussing self evaluation and implementing good practice guidance we advised the childminder to get copies of good practice guidance, such as Build the Ambition and Health and Social Care Standards. This is to keep them well informed and up to date with current thinking.
