Inspection report

About the service

Oakwood Nurseries Ltd is registered to provide a day care of children service to a maximum of 172 children aged from birth to 16 years.

Of those 172 no more than 56 will be aged from birth to under 3 years and will be cared for in Oak Cottage on the ground floor.

No more than 71 pre-school children will be cared for in the pre-school building and no more than 45 primary school age children up to 16 years will be cared for in the upper floor of Oak Cottage.

Within the upper floor of Oak Cottage under school aged children can be cared for within this room when school aged children are not attending.

The provider of the service is Oakwood Nurseries Ltd and registered with the Care Inspectorate on 1 April 2011. The service is located within a residential area of Burnside and is situated close to shops and transport links.

Aims of the service include promoting learning through play, providing support for parents and promoting high standards of practice.

As part of this inspection, we took into consideration Key Question 5 - Operating an early learning and childcare setting (including out of school care and childminders) during Covid-19 with a specific focus on Quality indicator 5.2: Infection prevention and control practices support a safe environment for children and staff. We will report on the overall performance of this indicator in Theme 1, Quality of Care and Support.

We check services are meeting the principles of Getting It Right For Every Child (GIRFEC), Scotland's national approach to improving outcomes for children, by offering the right help at the right time from the right people. It supports them and their parents to work with services that can help them. There are eight wellbeing indicators at the heart of GIRFEC: safe, healthy, achieving, nurtured, active, respected, responsible and included.

What people told us

We spoke with children during the inspection. Older children told us how their views influenced the experiences that were planned and they shared their favourite activities with us.

We spoke with four parents who stated they were happy with the care their children received. Positive comments reflect the warm relationships between the staff, children and families and the experiences available for children.

Self assessment

We did not request a self-assessment prior to inspection. We did look at the service improvement plan and this highlighted their priorities and plans for further development.

From this inspection we graded this service as:

What the service does well

Children were happy and settled within nursery and were responsive to cuddles supporting them to feel secure and loved.

Children were busy using a range of toys and materials that supported their play. In addition, staff asked questions at children's level allowing children to develop their thinking and ideas. The youngest children had fun in developing their physical skills using chutes, ball pits and see-saws.

Children accessed outdoors every day. This included use of a large enclosed garden, an outdoor classroom as well as a forest in Dumfries and regular visits to community parks. This ensured that they had lots of opportunities for fresh air, exercise and development of wellbeing.

Management and catering staff work in partnership with parents and children to create lunch time menus, which were healthy and met dietary needs. Staff supervised children which ensured their safety when eating.

Tracking of children's learning was in place and management and staff used South Lanarkshire Council's 'Together We Can and We Will' document, as well as the online journals which helped ensure children's needs were met.

Staff had participated in a range of training opportunities to support keeping children safe such as, Covid-19, fire safety and food hygiene. Further training opportunities to support children's learning and development, has also taken place and staff are in the early stages of embedding these.

Staff recruitment processes ensured that people with the right skills and knowledge were employed to provide care for children. A thorough induction programme supported this.

We were satisfied that the service had appropriate infection control procedures in place to support a safe environment for children and staff. For example, children being supported during handwashing routines and staff having received training on infection prevention and control which adheres to Covid-19 guidance.

Staff were aware of Child Protection procedures and how to keep children safe, including who to go to with concerns and where information is stored.

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What the service could do better

Younger children would benefit from further opportunities to access sensory play to promote their curiosity, problem solving, and exploration.

Transitions from play to lunchtime and afterwards should be further enhanced to ensure children have a sociable, relaxed lunch experience. Transitions had been identified by the service in their improvement plan.

To support staff practice and improve outcomes for all children, monitoring systems should be developed further, for example staff training reviews, consistent medication forms, and Scottish Social Services Council (SSSC) registrations.
