Early learning and childcare statistics 2014

The provision and use of registered daycare of children and childminding services in Scotland as at 31 December 2014

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The Care Inspectorate registers daycare of children services and childminding services, which this report refers collectively to as early learning and childcare.

In this report we present information on early learning and childcare services including:

- Children registered: this is calculated as the number of children registered with a service at 31 December 2014.
- Children attending: this is calculated as the number of children attending a service in the census week at 30 November 2014 as 31 December is not reflective of a typical week.
- Capacity is maximum attendance in a service at any one time, measured by number of registered places.
- Information on the quality of early learning and childcare services such as grading and complaints data is presented at 31 March 2015 to be reflective of the full inspection year.

Definitions of the terms we use

Childminding is defined by the Public Services Reform (Scotland) Act 2010 as:

Looking after one or more children on domestic premises for reward for a period of more than two hours in any day. However this does not include:

- Where children are closely related to the carer
- The fostering of children
- Caring for children in their own home.

By law, all childminding services must be registered with the Care Inspectorate.

Childminding services may operate in several ways:

- An individual may operate a childminding service alone.
- A partnership of two or more people may operate a single registered childminding service.
- Childminding services that are separately registered may work together in the home of one of the registered childminding providers.
- No matter which of the operating methods is used, a provider of a childminding service may have paid or unpaid assistants to help provide the childminding service.

Daycare of children is defined by the Public Services Reform (Scotland) Act 2010 as a service which provides care for children on non-domestic premises for a total of more than two hours per day and on at least six days per year. This includes nursery classes, crèches, after school care and playgroups. These services can be run on a public, private or voluntary basis.

The definition does not include services which are part of school activities. Nor does it include activities where care is not provided such as sports clubs or uniformed activities such as Scouts or Guides.

For the purposes of this statistical report, each of the registered daycare of children services has been assigned to one of the following categories of main service provision. This main service type is based on information supplied in annual returns. If a service did not respond to an annual return in a given year, then their main type of service has been estimated by using annual return information submitted in another year, or from other information about the service, for example their conditions of registration. The Care Inspectorate actively follows up on services that have not submitted an annual return throughout the submission period.

Children/family centre	Provides a similar service to a community nursery or nursery centre. Provides daycare and education together with a range of support services for families
Crèche	Provides drop-in care for children in order to enable adults to engage in activities such as further education, shopping or attending a meeting
Holiday play scheme	Provides a service which allows school age children to take part in a broad range of supervised leisure and educational activities during the school holidays (this does not include activity-based clubs)
Nursery	Provides daycare facilities for children aged 5 years or under. The service is normally used by parents/ carers on a regular basis rather than a drop-in basis and the service is provided as a minimum during the school term
Nursery providing additional childcare such as a breakfast club or out of school care	As above but where additional childcare (for example, breakfast club or out of school care) is recorded as being provided
Out of school care	Provides care for school age children in the absence of parents or carers from the end of the school day until parents can collect their children, and also before school starts
Out of school care providing additional childcare, such as a breakfast club or holiday play scheme	As above but where additional childcare (for example, breakfast club or holiday play scheme) is recorded as being provided
Playgroup	May also provide early learning and childcare in partnership with the local authority. They will usually rely heavily on parents or carers who volunteer their services, although may also employ paid staff for example a play-leader or assistant
Other services	Includes housing support related services, for example women's aid centres, and also services that cannot be easily assigned to one of the other categories (for example services providing for additional needs up to age 16 on a respite basis).

Number of children using registered early learning and childcare services in Scotland

Since 2010 the number of children registered and attending early learning and childcare services has been steadily increasing. The proportion of children attending a service increased more in daycare of children services rather than in childminding services. This suggests the increase may be a reflection of the amendment to the Children and Young People (Scotland) Act 2014 where, from August 2014, all three and four year olds and eligible two year olds, are entitled to a minimum of 600 hours free early learning and childcare; this represents an increase from 475 hours.

The number of children attending¹ early learning and childcare services and the size of these services has increased, although the overall number of services has decreased. Table A below shows that in November 2014, 229,840 children (25.2% of population aged 0-15 years old) attended registered early learning and childcare services in Scotland, an increase from the 223,980 (24.5% of population aged 0-15 years old) attending in this week the previous year.

The number of children attending childminding services has increased from 31,720 (3.5% of the 0-15 years population) in 2013 to 32,500 (3.6% of the 0-15 years population) in 2014. The same pattern is seen in daycare of children services with the number of children attending services increasing from 192,270 in 2013 to 197,340 in 2014 (21.0% to 21.7%.of the 0-15 years population).

The average number of children attending per early learning and childcare service in Scotland increased from 23.7 to 24.7 between 2013 and 2014. Children attending per childminding service increased from 5.6 to 5.8 and children attending daycare services increased from 51.1 to 52.9 over the year.

90% of children who were registered with a service at 31 December 2014 used the service in the census week.

¹Data will include some element of double counting since children can go to one service to receive the 600 hours entitlement and another service the rest of the time. These children will be counted as attending both. This is consistent with previous reporting arrangements and we can be confident that the data continues to highlight an increased uptake of childcare places across the country.


Number of children registered with early learning and childcare services in Scotland

Overall, 254,770 children were registered with an early learning and childcare service in 2014. Of these, 220,090 children were registered with daycare of children services and 34,680 with childminding services.

Most children registered with daycare of children services are registered with local authority providers (41%) followed by the private and voluntary and not-forprofit sectors (37% and 22% respectively). Figure A shows:

- Local authorities are the biggest providers of children and family centres and nurseries
- · Private sector services are the biggest providers of crèche services and provide a large proportion of nurseries and out of school care
- Voluntary sector services are the biggest providers of holiday play schemes, out of school care services and playgroups.

All childminding services operate in the private sector.



Number of registered early learning and childcare services in Scotland

Table B shows at 31 December 2014 there were 9,859² early learning and childcare services in Scotland. Of these, 3,757 were daycare of children services and 6,102 childminding services.

The total number of services decreased between 2013 and 2014, an on-going trend, but the decrease was smaller at 0.9% compared to a 1.3% decrease between 2012 and 2013.

Over the year, new registrations for early learning and childcare services increased by 8.0% from 697 in 2013 to 753 in 2014. Childminding service registrations increased by 7.2% and daycare of children services by 12.5%. The increase in registrations was offset by a greater number of cancellations, which increased by 2.2% from 828 in 2013 to 846 in 2014.




Figure B above shows that since 2008 (apart from a small increase in 2011) there has been a gradual reduction in the number of early learning and childcare services in Scotland. Between 2008 and 2014 early learning and childcare services decreased by 3.8%. Over the past three years childminding services decreased by 2.7% and daycare of children services by 1.8%.

Although the total number of services has decreased over the last three years there has been an overall increase in capacity (maximum attendance at any one time, measured by number of registered places) in daycare of children services. Places increased by 1.4% between 2013 and 2014, and 1.8% since 2012. Nursery capacity specifically has increased by 2.2% over the year and 2.4% over three years. Capacity in playgroups however fell by 10.8% over the year and by 18.6% since 2012. There was a 2% decrease in childminding services capacity over the three years between 2012 and 2014.

Table C above shows an overall increase in the average number of places per service since 2012. Places per service increased every year in daycare of children services whilst childminding places increased in 2013 and remained the same in 2014.

These findings are consistent with the fact that during 2014 the Care Inspectorate carried out just under 2,000 variations for registered daycare of children services to allow services to provide care to more children. Almost three quarters (73%) of these variations were in nurseries. The majority of these variations related to the new extended hours policy under the Children and Young People (Scotland) Act 2014.




Figure C above shows the pattern of daycare of children services between 2012 and 2014 by main type of provision. Many daycare of children services provide several types of service so the following analysis focuses on the **main** type only.

The number of nursery services remained constant between 2013 and 2014, with one additional service over the year, but has reduced since 2012 by 0.6%. Out of school care services increased over the year by 1.7% and 2.5% over three years. Crèche services, playgroups and holiday play schemes all decreased between 2012 and 2014. The biggest decrease in service type over the year between 2013 and 2014 was in playgroup services, where 26 services cancelled and only 3 new services registered, resulting in a 10.2% decrease (17.1% over three years). However, the number of services with playgroup as an additional type of service has increased from 20 in 2012 to 65 in 2014. Therefore, comparing playgroups overall (service main type plus additional service type), there is only a 4% decrease since 2012.

Table D above shows that 29% of daycare of children services provided an additional type of care over and above the main type of daycare, the same proportion as in 2013. Although the number of daycare services is decreasing, almost a third of registered daycare services are providing additional types of care for children.

Out of school care services are still the most likely service type to provide additional daycare (68% of services). Children and family centres also have a high proportion of services providing additional types of care (66% of services).

Holiday play schemes have the smallest proportion of services providing additional types of daycare at 8%, although 532 other services offer holiday play schemes as an additional type of service.

The most common additional service type offered by daycare of children services is a breakfast club service. 569 services provided a breakfast club, an increase from 545 in 2013.

Table E below shows a further breakdown of daycare of children services providing additional care. Breakfast clubs and holiday play schemes are the most common additional service type. The biggest change since last year was a 4% increase in services providing a breakfast club which was mainly seen in out of school care services. Out of school care and nursery services continue to be the biggest providers of breakfast clubs: out of the 569 services, 53% were out of school care services and 40% nurseries. In 2014, 227 nurseries also provided an out of school care service and 354 out of school care services also provided a holiday play scheme service.




Figure D (above) demonstrates the gradual rise in local authority and private sector daycare of children services and the decrease in not-for-profit sector services since 2012. This includes daycare of children services only as all childminding services are operated in the private sector.

In 2014 the local authority sector continued to provide the largest proportion of daycare of children services at 46%, followed by private sector services at 29% and the voluntary and not for profit sector at 25%.

The voluntary sector decreased from having 27% of daycare of children services in 2012 to 25% in 2014. The biggest decrease in daycare of children services was in playgroup services, where the majority of both services and cancellations were in the voluntary sector.

The main increase in the local authority and private sectors was in out of school care, with 14 additional services in private and 5 in local authority sectors.

Registered early learning and childcare services in local authority areas, urban and rural areas and by deprivation category

Local authority areas

There are some differences in the number of early learning and childcare services available and the number of children attending services across local authorities in Scotland. In general larger local authorities have fewer early learning and childcare services per head of population (age 0-15 years) and more children attending per service, compared to smaller local authorities. This is discussed in more detail in the next section on urban and rural areas.

Urban and rural areas

The distribution of services registered in urban and rural areas differs. Overall, more early learning and childcare services per head of population (age 0-15 years) are registered in rural areas than in urban areas.

- For childminding services there were 36.7 services per 10,000 population in large urban areas compared to 93.6 services per 10,000 population in accessible small towns.
- For daycare of children services there were 35.8 services per 10,000 population in large urban areas compared to 59.1 per 10,000 population in remote rural areas.
- For nursery services the lowest number of services per 10,000 population was in large urban areas (21.3) and the highest was in remote rural areas (48.8)

A difference in children attending between urban-rural category areas is highlighted below. Table F shows that:

- 29.5% of the child population attend an early learning and childcare service in remote small towns (the highest) compared to 13.9% in remote rural (the lowest).
- 5.6% of the child population attend a childminding service in accessible small towns compared to 1.9% in large urban areas
- Around 25% of children attend a daycare service in other urban areas and remote small towns compared to 10.7% in remote rural areas.
- 17.7% of the child population attend a nursery service in other urban areas compared to 8.8% in remote rural areas.
- 5.6% of the child population attend an out of school care service in large urban areas compared to 0.5% in remote rural areas

Scottish Index of Multiple Deprivation (SIMD) areas

There are differences in the number of childminding services between the most and least deprived areas in Scotland, with 20.3 registered childminding services per 10,000 head of population in the most deprived areas compared to 70.4 childminding services per 10,000 head of population in the least deprived.

The overall number of daycare of children services is similar between the most deprived and least deprived areas of Scotland, with 33.6 services per 10,000 population in the most deprived areas compared to 37.7 per 10,000 population in the least deprived.

⁴ It should be noted that children who live in one local authority may attend a service in another local authority, similarly with urban/rural areas and SIMD areas. Analysis is based on the service details and the child population in that area.

Some differences in attendance between these areas exist. Table G shows that:

- 20.8% of the child population in the most deprived areas attend a service there, compared to 29.7% in the least deprived areas.
- 1.0% of the child population in the most deprived areas attend a childminding service compared to 4.6% in the least deprived areas. (This may not be surprising given that in the most deprived areas there are far fewer childminding services per 10,000 head of population than in the least deprived areas (20.3 compared to 70.4)).
- 19.8% of children attend a daycare service in the most deprived areas compared to 25.2% in the least deprived.
- There is little difference in children attending nursery services between areas in the most and least deprived, 13.1% compared to 14.9%.

There are differences between daycare of children service providers in the most and least deprived areas of Scotland:

- 49.0% of daycare of children services in the most deprived areas are run by the local authority sector, 28.0% by the voluntary and 23.1% by the private sector.
- 45.0% of daycare of children services in the least deprived areas are run by the private sector, 28.4% by the voluntary and 26.6% by local authority sectors

There are some differences in grading pattern of services between the most and least deprived areas in Scotland . This difference is seen in childminding services:

- 30.6% of childminding services in the most deprived areas had all grades of very good and excellent compared to 56.9% in the least deprived areas. The proportion of childminding services with these grades increases as the level of deprivation decreases.
- 1.6% of childminding services in the most deprived areas had all grades of unsatisfactory and weak compared to 0.2% in the least deprived areas. Although this is not a continuous trend throughout the scale.
- 39.6% of daycare of children services in the most deprived areas had all grades of very good and excellent across all themes compared to 41.4% in the least deprived areas.
- 0.6% of daycare of children services in the most deprived areas had all grades of unsatisfactory and weak compared to 0.0% services with these grades in the least deprived areas.

Services providing funded early learning and childcare

Since August 2014, all children aged 3 and 4 years and some eligible 2 year olds are entitled to 600 hours of free early learning and childcare (ELCC), an increase from 475 hours previously. Most of the funded places will be available in nurseries. Local authorities may also decide to use childminding services for ELCC funded places.

Figure E shows that between 2013 and 2014 there was no overall change in the proportion of nurseries offering ELCC from 83% to 92%. The private sector had the smallest proportion of nurseries offering ELCC compared to local authority and the voluntary and not-for-profit sector.

In 2014 100% of local authority run nurseries were providing ELCC, compared to 78% of private and 90% of voluntary sector nurseries.




Table H below shows ELCC provided by other service types. There was an increase in children and family centres providing funded ELCC from 58% in 2013 to 76% in 2014. There was a slight increase in playgroup services offering ELCC from 67% in 2013 to 69% in 2014. No local authority playgroup services offered ELCC in 2014 (only four local authority playgroup services were registered with the Care Inspectorate as at 31 December 2014). Slight increases in ELCC provision were seen in private sector and voluntary sector playgroup services, rising from 62% to 64% in private sector run services and from 69% to 71% in voluntary sector services.

Service provision

Language and service philosophies as at 31 December 2014

Excluding childminding services, 99% (3,713) of early learning and childcare services used the English language in delivering the service, an increase from 98% in 2013. The other 1% (20) operate a fully Gaelic service.

Around 1% (32) daycare of children services followed a Suzuki/Montessori philosophy, the same proportion as in 2013.

The Steiner approach was used in 0.4% (15) services, similar to in 2013.

School term / holiday availability as at 31 December 2014

In term time:

- 72% of early learning and childcare services offered a breakfast or preschool service
- 79% had an after school hours service.

During school holidays:

- 42% of early learning and childcare services operate a before 8am service
- 72% of services operate during working hours.

Sessions available and whether drop-in or planned as at 31 December 2014

Excluding childminding services, 46% of services gave the option of either whole-day or part-day sessions, an increase from 44% in 2013.

94% of daycare of children services in the private sector gave the option of both whole day and part day attendance compared to 21% in local authority services and 56% in voluntary services.

Services in the local authority and voluntary sectors are more likely to offer part time only sessions, 80% and 41% respectively, compared to the private sector where only 3% of services are part time only services.

Excluding crèche services, almost all services were available on a planned rather than drop-in basis.

Meals and snacks as at 31 December 2014

Around 94% of childminding services provided meals in the service, an increase from 93% in 2014. These meals were provided by either the service, the parents or by both. Almost all (99.5%) childminding services provided snacks for the children in the service.

Around 39% of daycare of children services provided meals in the service (whether by the service, parents or both), the same proportion as in 2013. 99% of services, provided snacks and in services which were providing snacks, 83% were supplied by the service only.

Quality of early learning and childcare services

Early learning and childcare services grades as at 31 March 2015

The grading picture for early learning and childcare services remained similar between March 2014 and March 2015.

Table I above shows that at 31 March 2015:

- around half of all childminding services were graded very good or excellent across all quality themes
- 0.4% of childminding services had all grades of unsatisfactory or weak.
- 42.2% of daycare of children services had all grades of very good and excellent
- 0.3% of daycare of children services had all grades of unsatisfactory or weak

Early learning and childcare services and complaints as at 31 March 2015

In the year to 31 March 2015, the Care Inspectorate completed 606 complaint investigations about early learning and childcare services. Most of these were about daycare of children services -71% (431) - and the remaining 29% (175) about childminding services.

We upheld 52.6% (92) complaints in childminding services and 46.9% (202) in daycare of children services.

Each complaint can be about a number of different areas. Of the complaints we upheld in early learning and childcare services during the year, the top five reasons for complaint were: general health and welfare, communication (between staff and service users/relatives/carers), staffing levels, conditions of registration (other than exceeding capacity) and conditions of registration (exceeding capacity).

In daycare of children services we completed 53.9 complaints per 1,000 services, a decrease from 54.1 per 1,000 services in 2014.

In childminding services we completed 15.4 complaints per 1,000 services, an increase from 12.4 per 1,000 services in 2014.

Technical appendix

Background and Methodology

The Care Inspectorate regulates care services for children and adults in Scotland. This includes a wide range of services for children and young people, such as fostering, adoption and residential care. This publication focuses on childminding and daycare of children services, collectively known as early learning and childcare services in this report. Statistics on, for example, looked after children are published by the Scottish Government and can be found at: www.scotland.gov.uk/Topics/Statistics/Browse/Children/Publications

- This paper reports on the provision and use of daycare of children and childminding services registered with the Care Inspectorate as at 31 December 2014. Each daycare of children service can provide a range of different types of provision, for example a nursery can also provide a breakfast club and out of school care. In this report we have only used the main type of provision so a service that provides a nursery as main provision but also provides out of school care, will only be recorded as a nursery. This may lead to under-reporting of the availability of some types of provision.
- Previous versions of this report which were published to cover the years 2010, 2011, 2012 and 2013 are available at www.careinspectorate.com.
- The statistics in this report are produced using information from the latest Care Inspectorate annual returns which asked for information about the previous calendar year (1 January 2014 to 31 December 2014) and the Care Inspectorate service list (as at 31 December 2014). Figures relating to previous years are taken from the Childcare Statistics 2010, 2011 2012 and 2013 publications.
- Our inspectors use the annual returns when planning care service inspections and carrying out risk assessments. Some of the information in the return is also aggregated and used by the Care Inspectorate to inform wider statistical analysis and comparisons across, for example, care service providers and geographical areas.
- The Care Inspectorate requires (under the Public Services Reform (Scotland) Act 2010, section 53(6)) all providers that are registered with the Care Inspectorate to complete and submit an annual return in order to provide the Care Inspectorate with the information needed to help plan and carry out inspections effectively. Although services registered after 1 October 2014 do not have to submit an annual return for December 2014, we encourage them to do so.
- Of the 9,859 childcare services registered with the Care Inspectorate as at 31 December 2014, 8,686 (88%) submitted an annual return, a 1% decrease compared to the previous year. The annual return data has been weighted to deal with non-response. For this reason some of the tables contain figures which have been rounded to the nearest 10, therefore rounded figures may differ slightly to the overall totals.

Please note that where a table contains percentages, those that are based on numbers equal to or smaller than 10 are shown in colour.

Data sources

Care Inspectorate service list (as at 31 December 2014) has been used to provide figures on:

- the total number of registered 'Daycare of Children' and 'Childminding' services
- whether services were active or inactive
- whether services were run by local authority, private or not-for-profit
- the registered capacity of each service (that is the total number of children that can be cared for at any one time)
- the postcode of the service, from which we have derived the local authority, deprivation category and urban-rural category of the service.

Care Inspectorate annual returns (as at 31 December 2014) have been used to provide estimates for:

- the main service type, for example nursery, playgroup, out of school care and so on
- the number of children using the service in the last full week before 30 November 2014
- the number of children registered with the service as at 31 December 2014
- the age groups catered for and term-time/holiday-time availability of the service
- whether the service was available drop-in or planned and whole-day or part-day
- whether the service provided early learning and childcare
- whether meals or snacks were provided by the service or by the parents
- the languages and service philosophies used by services
- · characteristics of childminding services.

Data cleaning and dealing with missing data

Where there have been any data-input errors or incomplete responses identified in relation to specific questions, these have been fixed where possible before any analysis has taken place. For example, where a service's status was 'active' as at 31 December 2014 but the service reported working zero hours and recorded zero number of users the status was changed to 'inactive' before any analysis has taken place (for this reason the count of active childminding services published in this report differs from that published by the Scottish Social Services Council in their Workforce Data report).

Not all childcare services have submitted an annual return. This means that there are some gaps in the data which we need to take account of.

For dealing with missing data, the following approach has been taken:

A. Identification of under-representation in annual return responses:

Within the responses of annual returns, it may be possible that some types of services are less likely to respond than other types of services. If this isn't adjusted then the final results would likely be biased towards the characteristics of services that had responded and therefore not representative of the entire set of registered services.

Logistic regression⁵ has been used to help establish specific characteristics of services that appeared to be significant factors in terms of the likelihood of nonresponse to an annual return. In December 2014 only childminding services and nurseries showed other factors above main service type being a factor in response rates: In childminding services level of deprivation (service location), capacity of service (number of children that can be cared for at any one time), local authority (service location) and grades of service affected response to annual return. Only capacity of service in nurseries was a factor over and above main service type.

⁵ Logistic regression is a type of statistical analysis used for predicting the outcome of a categorical variable based on one or more other variables

B. Weighting and grossing-up data to obtain overall estimates:

Weights were calculated for the significant factors associated with non-response. This is so we could adjust for the types of services that we knew were under represented by a certain level in the annual return responses. We then applied the weights to each type of service in grossing-up⁶ the annual return data rather than simply grossing-up evenly across all services. This has produced final estimates which should be more representative of the overall mix of different types of registered services.

C. Testing the impact of using weighted data:

To help assess the impact of applying weights to the annual return data, some of the final results have been compared to estimates obtained from simply grossing up without weights (that is ignoring any potential under-representation).

For the number of children attending a childminding service at end of November 2014, the weighted results (as used in the publication tables) produce an estimate of 32,500. This is higher than the non-weighted and non-grossed up figure of 28,780.

For early learning and childcare services excluding childminding services, the weighted results (as used in the publication tables) produce an estimate of 197,340 children attending services. This is higher than the non-weighted grossed up figure of 190,110.

⁶ Grossing-up is the process of multiplying values (such as the number of children attending a service, or the number of childminders with a qualification) equally by a factor between 1.0 and 1.9 to account for services that did not submit an annual return. Weighted grossing-up is the process of multiplying values by a factor that varies depending on the combined characteristics of the service to which the value belongs.

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
