INTERNATIONAL ENGLISH LANGUAGE TESTING SYSTEM (IELTS) CERTIFICATES – POTENTIAL FRAUD RISK – ACTION FOR BOARDS

- A potential fraud risk has been highlighted following the identification of fraudulently acquired International English Language Testing (IELTS) certificates presented by a small number of internationally trained healthcare professionals to a number of Trusts in England and Wales.
- 2. Boards are therefore requested to take immediate action to ensure registration with the appropriate IELTS verification service to provide assurance and support effective governance.
- 3. In order to reduce the risk of sponsoring or employing internationally trained staff who provide fraudulent certificates, Boards should register with the verification service here (IELTS) Verifying IELTS results) to check the veracity of documents. This check applies to all international staff seeking employment across the registered workforce, and also to those who may be seeking more general employment, as roles such as healthcare support workers may be undertaken whilst awaiting registration with the appropriate statutory regulatory body. Employers should not rely solely on checks undertaken by third parties such as recruitment agencies.
- Any instances of fraudulent activity should be reported to NHS Counter Fraud liaison contacts, any statutory regulatory body such as <u>HCPC</u>, <u>GMC</u>, <u>NMC</u> and to UK Visas and Immigration (<u>UKVI</u>).

Annex – For Information

A person applying for a UK visa to work, study or live in the UK, will be required to prove knowledge of by passing a Secure English Language Test (SELT). The NMC, HCPC and GMC all require language tests as evidence that candidates have ability to communicate effectively in English and upon passing at the required level will obtain a certificate for UK Visas and Immigration (UKVI) purposes. The IELTS, therefore, allows a person to enter the country to work in the UK in a sponsored role and to register with regulatory body.
