CRIME PREVENTION ADVICE FOR CARE HOMES

Police Scotland is currently investigating a series of break-ins to care homes across Scotland where safes have been stolen from office areas. Significant efforts are being made to identify those responsible but we also ask care home owners and managers to consider their building security.

There are some simple measures you can take to protect your property;

- Ensure that all outside entrances and inside security doors have adequate security mechanisms fitted and locks, bolts and other fitments are security rated standard. Check the locks and fitments on a regular basis to ensure that they are working and fit for purpose.
- Ensure all windows are fitted with good quality locks and limiters and are fully secured, ensuring that both the fitments and window glass meet the required standards.
- With particularly vulnerable windows, at ground floor, or others that are easily accessible, and those containing high value property/safes, consider fitting security bars or grilles where fire safety regulations allow. Laminated glass or security film that can be applied to existing glass to make it more resistant to hostile attack.
- Store cash and valuables securely, preferably in a room with CCTV. An insurance rated safe should be bolted to the floor. Anti-tamper sensors can be fitted to set off an alarm if attacked
- Ensure that a competent, recorded locking up procedure is in place. Nominate trusted members of staff to check that all doors and windows are closed and locked at the end of each day, as per procedure

- Maintain good visibility around the perimeter of your building? E.g. cutting back overgrown planting.
- Ensure you have adequate security lighting around your building during the hours of darkness. Focus on doors, windows, skylights and any other entry points. Install cages over exterior lights and power sources to prevent tampering.
- Consider CCTV and ensure it covers the entrances, exits and any rooms critical to our business including cash offices.
- Be vigilant for any suspicious activity around your premises and if in doubt notify police
- Most break-ins occur at the rear of properties as it is “out of sight”. Consider erecting weldmesh fencing to ensure access to the rear of the building is controlled.
